

A Names Committee from this campus has received and reviewed recommendations for an appropriate name for our new residence hall. The Committee voted unanimously to submit two (2) names in alphabetical order for consideration. The names are:

- ✓ Dr. Samuel M. Brownell
- Dr. Thomas J. Vitelli

For your information, I am enclosing biographical and supportive material.

While I do not wish to minimize Dr. Brownell's notable career, I would submit Dr. Vitelli's name as the first choice. The reasons for recommending Dr. Vitelli's name are as follows:

1. It would be more appropriate to name a student services building after a Dean of Students rather than a President. In other words, the nature of the facility needs to be considered.
2. None of our other residence halls are named after Presidents. With the exception of Farnham Hall, residence halls have been named after teaching faculty.
3. Naming the building after an individual who distinguished himself as an advocate for students would be a symbolic way of recognizing the contributions of support services.
4. Dr. Vitelli was a member of the Philosophy Department prior to becoming Dean of Student Affairs. He was recognized on the campus as a scholar and a humanitarian.

Thank you in advance for the consideration given to both names.

Thomas J. Vitelli dies at 51; retired dean, area educator

ORANGE — Thomas J. Vitelli, 51, of 595 Ridge Road, former dean of students at Southern Connecticut State College, died Saturday at Yale-New Haven Hospital.

His funeral will be held at 9:15 a.m. Tuesday starting in the Peter H. Torello & Son Funeral Home, 1022 Dixwell Ave., Hamden. A Mass of Christian Burial will be celebrated at 10 in Holy Infant Church, Race Brook Road. Burial will be in Mount St. Peter's Cemetery, Derby. Memorial donations may be made to the Thomas J. Vitelli Scholarship Fund, Southern Connecticut State College, 501 Crescent St., New Haven.

Mr. Vitelli was born in New Haven, Feb. 28, 1929, son of the late Adam Thomas and Angelina Ortale Vitelli. He was a resident of New Haven before moving to Orange several years ago.

He was awarded his bachelor of arts degree and master of arts degree in administration from Fairfield University and obtained his sixth-year certificate from the University of Connecticut. In 1963, he was awarded his doctor of philosophy degree from Fordham University, New York. A student of the classics, he was given special recognition for presenting his thesis in bilingual format.

He taught English, Latin, Italian and Spanish and served as chairman of the language department at Wilbur Cross High School in New Haven, instituting innovations to the language program and received many awards for his role as class adviser. He taught also in the New Haven Evening High School Division from 1954 to 1965, and later was a professor of philosophy at Fairfield University during summer sessions. He taught philosophy and ethics courses at Albertus Magnus College, New Haven.

He was named assistant professor of philosophy at Southern Connecticut State College in September 1965, and was dean of students there in July 1967. It was a position he held until retirement two and one-half years ago.

While at SCSC, he was recognized by the administration and student body for his expertise in correlating student affairs, and he served as chief mediator of student concerns during the 1968 campus unrest.

He served as treasurer of the American Association of University Professors and chairman of the Dean of Students Association, working on the evaluation committee of the American Secondary School and Junior College Evaluators. As dean of student affairs, he participated in the White House Conference on Higher Education of American Students and served as a liaison for the Danford Foundation at SCSC.

Mr. Vitelli initiated the Christian education program for the Legionnaires of Christ upon their arrival in to the area, serving as teacher and counselor to the new seminarians. A communicant of Holy Infant Church, he was an extraordinary minister of the Eucharist, volunteer director of religious education, developer of the parish education during the 1960s, a member of parish fund-raising drives, on the parish school building committee, chairman of its education committee and president of the parish council.

In New Haven, he was a member of the New Haven Teachers League. He also was a member of the Connecticut and National education associations and the Connecticut Employees Association, the National Language Association for Educators and National Honorary Society of Spanish-Speaking Educators.

He leaves three brothers, Gabriel W. Vitelli of Orange, George T. Vitelli of Milford, superintendent of Milford Public Schools, and Eugene F. Vitelli of Woodbridge, director of secondary schools, New Haven; a sister, Mary E. Vitelli of Orange; three nieces and nine nephews.


